A special thanks to all who participated in this year's Christmas Food Basket project. On December 14th, we celebrated our 40th year for this project where volunteers of all ages packed and delivered over 13,000 pounds of food to 100 families in need in the Wichita area. From the generosity of our parishioners, we raised over \$13,500.00 to purchase the groceries. Along with the groceries, parishioners delivered gifts that were bought especially for the children of the families. Following the deliveries, volunteers enjoyed a pizza lunch at AJ's Sports Grill, hosted by the Community Support Ministry.

This is a beautiful tradition of giving that brings children and adults of all ages together to help others in need. Since

1983, with the help of God and many generous parishioners, we have raised over \$320,000.00, purchased and distributed over 410,000 pounds of food, and provided 3,625 families in Wichita with food for the holidays.

Special thanks to Denise Johnston and Joy Farha with Ray Sales who ordered and organized the groceries, and to all the men and women who helped tape the boxes, set up the tables and the food, assigned the deliveries, and organized the gifts. We also want to thank Pratt Industries for donating the 400 boxes we packed.

Many lives are touched by this project and we thank everyone for helping to make a difference.



### CATHEDRAL ICONOGRAPHY - UPDATE

At its meeting of November 14, the Cathedral Parish Council approved a new phase of iconography, progressing toward the completion the plan originally laid out prior to the construction of the Cathedral.

The major icons will be on the spaces above the west-facing colonnades to the right and left of the altar. The theme on the south side will be Moses at the Burning Bush. To the north, the Transfiguration will be placed. Behind the iconostasis, the icon of the Annunciation to the Theotokos will be split between the north and south back wall. On the north and south side walls above the iconostasis, the icons of the hierarchs will be installed.


The major scene icons (Burning Bush, Transfiguration, Annunciation) are priced at \$20k each. The hierarchs are \$3k each.


# St George Choir Sings

### THE NATIVITY AND ALMSGIVING, Part One

The hymn of the angels at the Nativity of Christ is the key verse to the practical meaning of this feast. The angels of heaven sing: 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill among men' (Luke 2:14). God is always glorified in the highest, and through His presence, peace is achieved on earth and goodwill enters the hearts and souls of mankind.

If the glory of God in the highest, the peace on earth, and the goodwill among men are interconnected, then the responsibility for achieving them falls primarily on the believers. The incarnation of the Lord Jesus teaches us to be messengers of peace and apostles of joy. This great responsibility is not fulfilled by excessive concern for the appearances of the holiday, but by working seriously to make the Lord ever present in and directing our lives.

Hence, this feast gains priority among believers in knowing how Jesus Christ was born in their souls. If they remain during the feast and after it as they were before, this means that the feast has not achieved its goal inside of them. Church feasts are stations for self-examination, and new beginnings to a more advanced extent in the life of virtue and the fruition of the Holy Spirit.

Today, Christmas is an essential moment to think about bringing joy to the hearts of despondent, sad, displaced and suffering people all around us. Unfortunately, their population is on the rise. The most important question is: How do we bring them joy? The answer is simple: by giving – morally, spiritually, emotionally and materially. Reviewing the customs associated with this feast is necessary and essential for all believers. On this feast, let us invite each other to activate our participation in bringing joy to our brothers and sisters in God.

How do we return the customs of this feast to their origin? Consider the popular tradition of exchanging gifts

and distributing alms to the needy on this blessed holiday. The origin of this tradition goes back to the Christian belief that God has presented humanity the greatest gift at Christmas, the second person of the Holy Trinity, His Word, His Son, in order to save it. Therefore, believers offer gifts to one another as a token of gratitude to God for His greatest gift: Jesus Christ.

Like everything transcendent, the concept of giving is distorted by sinful humans and diverted from its original meaning. In like manner, this tradition has become disfigured with excessive consumerism where exchanging gifts is now a mere imposed seasonal tradition. Anyone can see the excess in this area. Gifts should not be exchanged between people just because "it is Christmas," regardless of the receivers and their needs. Nevertheless, it remains a beautiful custom, although it needs more spirituality and personalization.

Believers first present themselves as pure offerings to the Lord. The Lord came to us to save us, so we, in turn, present ourselves to Him pure and clean with sincere repentance and a noticeable change for the better.

Then, we present to our brothers, sisters, loved ones and friends a simple, thoughtful and joyful offering. Hence, it has become customary on the eve of this feast for all family members to gather for Christmas dinner.

The most important thing is for believers to visit the grieving, the needy, and the neglected, bringing whatever they can provide them during the Nativity Fast.

This feast is an occasion to practice giving. God gave us Himself, so we give Him ourselves. God visited us with His great mercy, so we visit others with our love derived from His love.

#### EmberHope Youthville - donation and tour

Meaghan Koci and I met with Tamber Rouse on Tuesday, November 26th. She showed us around the Emberhope campus located Newton. Founded by the United Methodist Church more than 95 years ago, EmberHope Youthville began with a gift from the estate of Mr. Edward P. Libbey. This gift, combined with funds from the City of Newton, enabled the purchase of 30 acres to build the Kansas Methodist Home for Children. Originally started as an orphanage, it has evolved to provide resources and support to at-risk youth and families through many trauma-sensitive programs. The Newton campus is currently psychiatric residential treatment cottages, an alternative school and their administrative building, affectionately called Libbey Hall after their generous benefactor.

EmberHope is currently undergoing massive change and growth. They were awarded the contract for the Sedgwick County foster care program this year. They had previously run this program from 1997-2013. They applied for a grant to improve the campus and are currently undergoing the process of tearing down older buildings to replace with a low-income housing development for the elderly and youth that age out of the foster care system. The psychiatric residential treatment cottages currently house 12 girls who are either in state custody or their families have placed them there. These girls attend the alternative school that is located on campus along with other youth from the community that have applied to go to the school. They are at capacity and have a long waiting list for the school. The organization also supports hundreds of foster children in Sedgwick County and foster families all over the state. They are building more psychiatric residential treatment housing in Goddard. They have plans to build homes on the Newton campus for foster families to live in and have access to the counseling and other services they provide on-site.

Tamber mentioned that they have an annual volunteer week in June where volunteers will round up donations, work on landscaping, help organize donations or work on special projects.
