



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St Julian Celebration

ST JULIAN (ELIAN) OF HOMS, SYRIA MARTYR & UNMERCENARY

St. Julian of Homs, Syria (sometimes his name is given as Elian) grew up in a family that was not Christian. More importantly, his father strongly opposed Christian¬ity. Thus when Julian discovered the Christian faith, he set himself at odds with his powerful father and the rest of his

family. This was heartbreaking for the young man, but he felt he had no choice but to follow the truth he had found.

During his years in school, Julian had found that he had a gift for healing. When he became a Christian, it seemed natural that he should offer his medical services without charging for them. Those patients often found that their souls as well as their bodies benefited from the ministrations of this doctor who healed in the name of Jesus Christ. Yet there were other non- Christian doctors who resented his success.

When a violent persecution of Christians broke out in the city of Homs, they seized their chance. They went to his father and convinced him that he must persuade Julian to give up his practice of healing in the name of Jesus Christ. To do otherwise, they said, would be dangerous for the young man while the persecutions were going on.

This put Julian in a serious dilemma. He didn't wish to em-barrass his father by refusing to obey him. But he knew that God had given him a wonderful gift of healing, for which he was responsible to God. This responsibility, he knew, was greater than any human one.

When they saw that Julian was continuing his practice, his enemies encouraged the governor to imprison him along with other Christians. But when Julian found himself in prison with believers will—ing to suffer for their faith, he felt not sorrow, but only joy.

After many terrible beatings and much torture, the day came for Julian to be executed. He heard a voice saying, "Do not be be grieved, O Julian, a crown has been prepared for you. You will conquer your enemies and the devil's tricks. Do not fear torture, for I am with you!"

Julian's own father put him to death, but he did not die immediately and managed to crawl to a cave and died there. Years later, a church was built at the cave where he died, and his body was put in a marble coffin. The site became a place of pilgrimage and healings, which the saint had anticipated when he prayed before his death, "O Lord, give peace to any who remember me on the day of my martyrdom, forgiving their sins and protecting them from the enemy's snares. Defend Your lambs against the wolves."

THE NATIVITY AND ALMSGIVING, Part Two

This simple reflection on Christmas leads us to the Christian concept of giving. The first attitude required of Christians is to be open to the gift of God, because when they accept the divine gift and appreciate its importance and role in their life, they become worthy to practice giving in turn. "By this we know love, that He laid down his life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren" (1 John 3:16).

The Bible urges us to give and places great importance on giving. In the Old Testament (Deuteronomy 26), giving tithes was an expression of man's gratitude to God for the gifts He has given us. In the New Testament, this concept extends beyond tithes to giving everything. The Lord says, "Give to anyone who asks of you" (Matthew 5:42), meaning that Christ asks His disciples to keep their hearts and hands open. Ears unwilling to hear are a sign of hardness of heart, unbefitting of a disciple of Christ.

Christian giving does not have a certain limit; it is open to perfection. Humans give according to their ability. But this ability is determined by their love for the Lord, and their appreciation for what He has done and is doing for them. It is also determined by the degree of their freedom from the love of possession, and their awareness of the importance of almsgiving to the extent where almsgiving will become their joy.

Many people give in order to fulfill the divine commandment, while others give to gain God's blessings and to please God. Both types of giving are acceptable, but incomplete. Giving is linked to the spiritual level that the giver has reached. There are those who have reached the point of imitating Christ literally by giving everything, even offering their entire lives. The love of almsgiving grows in us exponentially as we grow in the love of God.

Some refrain from giving for many reasons. These people have not experienced the joy of giving and its effect on them. People often think that giving gladdens the hearts of those who receive it. This is undoubtedly true, but does it not gladden the heart of the giver more? The Bible says: "A generous soul will be enriched, and he who waters will himself be watered" (Prov. 11:25). It has been said: "The Lord loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor. 9:7). The joy of the gift's recipient is a double joy for the givers, because God blesses them.

Giving does not stop at material things. It is a state that believers experience constantly, until it becomes permanent. Do not deprive yourself of giving, and do not make any excuses, lest you remain closed to yourself. Your sincere smile may provide refreshment for a sad soul. Your look of tenderness and compassion may revive a suffering person who lacks love and care. The warm touch of your hand may restore the spirit of someone feeling neglected and lonely.

No one is exempt from the virtue of giving. Let us remember the widow's mite. The lesson lies in your willingness to give before the quality and quantity of gifts. Imitate your incarnate Lord for your sake and for your salvation. Respond to His amazing giving by imitating it as much as you are able, and you will see how many blessings you will reap for yourself. Giving frees you from selfishness, isolation, self-love and fear, which can kill. Christ did not come to keep you captive; He came to liberate you and give you the fullness of life. Throw yourself before Him and pile the dust of your selfishness at the feet of the Divine Child. Open your hands to be filled with His gifts, so that you can happily pass them on to your brethren, and the celebration of the feast will truly begin.

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Orthodox Christians for Life Theotokos Icon

"Schema-Archimandrite Jonah (Ignatenko) - the famous elder from Odessa - blessed people to organize a religious procession and go throughout Ukraine in order to stop abortions. The priest said that the cup of God's patience was overflowing and if that terrible and wholesale extermination of children was not stopped, the Lord would punish the people. According to the words of the elder, if religious processions were to take place and people would repent of the sin of abortion, the Lord will extend the time for repentance.

For a long time nothing could be organized and there was

no icon. Then, one day the Mother of God revealed an icon on a flat stone by the seashore to a resident of Kyiv, Tatiana, who was an iconographer and parishioner of the Makarievsky parish. She saw a drawing in the stone that gave her the idea for an icon.

Tatiana began to sketch her idea on a piece of paper showing the grieving Theotokos holding the Infant Christ and the Lord stretching out His hands to the murdered infant held by an angel with red blood flowing



from the baby. As she continued to sketch, it grew dark however she noticed that only the piece of paper, the place around it, the pen and the stone were glowing with light so that she could finish the drawing!

Later, the Metropolitan of Kiev and All Ukraine, Volodymyr, blessed her to paint a large icon and make a religious procession with it. The icon of the Mother of God was called "Our Lady the Theotokos Grieving for Infants Killed in the Womb".

On August 14, 2012, the first All-Ukrainian penitential religious procession "For the

salvation of unborn children and the preservation of family values" was started. For more than a year people went through the territory of Ukraine from east to west and from north to south, about 4.5 thousand kilometers long. The icon of the Mother of God turned out to be miraculous. The icon which shed tears during the procession began to open the hearts of many women, leading them to repentance."
